- Impact of a Pharmacy Benefit Manager (PBM) Clinical Program on Behavioral Health Medication Management in Children and Adolescents (Session Code: F1-Q1C)
 - The use of antipsychotic medications in children and adolescents has increased significantly in recent decades. Antipsychotic medications can increase the risk of developing serious health concerns, including metabolic syndrome which can lead to poor cardio-metabolic outcomes in adulthood. These populations have a high likelihood of multiple medication-related problems and would benefit from a pharmacist-led drug therapy management program. This session will showcase how a PBM clinical pharmacist can impact behavioral health medication management in children and adolescents.
